According to the New York Times, the average American family spends 24 hours a month shopping. Therefore ...

Two or three days later the man in blue, or brown, delivers your stuff.


Sounds pretty good doesn't it?

so more arrives ...




before you become in-opportuned.

How many times last year did you buy cold cereal?
Cold cereal can arrive on your door step just before you
shake the crumbs out of the last box.

How about tooth paste? Shampoo? Dog food?
Panty hose? Gym socks?

Have you ever thought about how much “stuff” you buy more than once a year?



Probably not ... there was never a need to know.

If you need tooth paste, you buy tooth paste.

Knowing you use six tubes of tooth paste a year
did not make any difference.

What if it **COULD** **make a difference?**


